1700 years ago this month, a group of Christian leaders gathered together in the town of Nicaea, Greece, to affirm the Christian faith together. At the time, there was a bit of controversy over core Christian teachings, a few false voices got really loud, and people were concerned. So leaders from churches throughout the known world convened to agree on what Christians have always believed. They didn't come up with new beliefs; rather, they discussed and debated to get as close as possible to what the whole church has always believed the Bible teaches. And they wrote down the things they agreed upon in a statement, which we now call THE NICENE CREED.

Aside from the Bible, the Nicene Creed might be the single most significant piece of Christian writing. Defining the core Christian beliefs of millions upon millions of Christians throughout history. The Nicene Creed unites us all, Catholics,, Lutherans, Presbyterians, Methodists, Congregationalists, and more. It is often read and recited in different churches and serves as a standard for the historic Christian faith.

In honor of the 1700 year anniversary of the Nicene Council, I encourage you to take some time this month to read and study the Nicene Creed. At Theology on Tap, we will discuss the Nicene Creed, its history, its importance, & its teaching (6pm, Thursday, May 15). Here are four questions to consider when reading the Nicene Creed on your own (maybe try to read it once a week during May and ask one of these questions each time you read it). 1) What does the Nicene Creed claim about Jesus? 2) What does the Nicene Creed claim about G-d? 3) Who is the Nicene Creed written for (who is the We)? 4)Is there anything in the Nicene Creed that surprises you & you want to learn more about?



140th Anniversary Story - From the Archives

On November 1st, 1885, a group of twenty-six men and women organized the Baxter Congregational Church. Services were held in Smith Hall on North Main St. Charter Members were:

Early in the spring of '86 the little group began building a church across the tracks on the site of the Hilpipre Barber Shop. The church, a rectangular wooden building, had a square entry room on the west end, with a door to the north & one to the south. Above was a bell tower that called the people to worship each Sunday. Around the church to the north, east, & south were hitching racks, for these were horse & buggy days! Buildings on Main Street were almost always wooden structures crowded against each other without any kind of a fire wall. There was also a wide use of lanterns and candles then, as electricity had not yet arrived in small towns, as well as a lack of central heating systems.

On October 10th 1897, a fire ravaged through Baxter's business district. The fire had started at Fred Graef's Livery Stable, but despite the heroic efforts of the citizens the fire raged out of control & burned through a block & a half of the west side of the street. Twenty-two buildings & sixteen businesses were destroyed, which included the Baxter Congregational Church. The church, as well as many of the other buildings, was then rebuilt using brick in place of wood. Then again, on April 28th 1899, a second fire having started in Hager Brothers Implement House just south of the church became unmanageable & a strong wind blew the fire over to the roof of the church. In a few moments the church was aglow & shortly after was reduced to ashes. This fire had wiped out the east side of Main Street. So, the congregation & many other businesses were back to developing plans for new buildings. When rebuilt the block housed People's State Bank, C.C. Cammack & Company, Floyd Dodd, John Boyd, C.C. Cafe, and C.S. Weston. The church which stood on the site of the People's State Bank was moved to its present site.

The church was then remodeled & enlarged extensively in 1950. During the winter of 1953, the Men's Club began looking for something they could do to earn money toward a parsonage fund. Otto Schumann, a retired farmer, proposed the club take over 190 acres of his land to farm on a 50-50 grain share basis for two years. The project actually continued on for a longer period of time. The cost of the parsonage that was to be erected across from the church was estimated to be around \$23,500. However, the cost would have been much greater if not for the many hours of labor donated by over 75 loyal members & friends. Raymond Holtsclaw, a member of the congregation, supervised the construction & gave generously of his time and skill. Once completed, dedication services for the parsonage were held on December 2nd, 1956. After the new brick parsonage was complete, the old parsonage was torn down, & the grounds were landscaped to include a parking lot.

The church farm project cultivated a finer community spirit & fellowship with one another. Many of the workers were neither a member of the club or church, but they & their equipment stood ready to help when the call came for plows, discs, harrows, or just "back & knuckle" work. The farmers felt a closeness to God in this project. They were earning something needed in the life of the church, & they were caring for this God-given soil.
